"Landslide" was certified Gold in October 2009 for sales of over 500,000 copies in the United States. According to Nielsen Soundscan, "Landslide" was certified Gold in October 2009 for sales of 2017.[2] In 2021, it was listed at No. 163 on Rolling Stone's "Top 500 Best Songs of All Time".[3] History Nicks has said that she wrote the song while contemplating either going back to school or continuing on professionally with guitarist Lindsey Buckingham. Their album Buckingham Nicks had been dropped by Polydor Records before they could release a follow up. Nicks wrote the song while visiting Aspen, Colorado, sitting in someone's living room "looking out at the Rocky Mountains pondering the avalanche of everything that had come crashing down on us ... at that moment, my life truly felt like a landslide in many ways".[4] The song is one of Fleetwood Mac's most frequently performed during tours. Nicks has sung it on every Fleetwood Mac tour since joining the band, with the exception of the Shake the Cage tour, as well as on all of her own solo tours from 2005 onwards.[5] A live performance of "Landslide" also appear on The Dance (1997), Live in Boston (2004), Crystal Visions - The Very Best of Stevie Nicks (2007) (with the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra), The Soundstage, and the Live in Chicago DVD.
